Hard work on the practice range followed. Focus on a better posture and rhythm helped in ball striking. Hours of short game practice have helped the scoring ability. The natural sanguinity, which he thanks his father for, is back. The birth of his second son Shiva in December 2007 brought a lot of joy to the family and perhaps a lot of good luck too.

Practising alongside the "player to beat" Tiger Woods, and the easy camaraderie they share, helped. Arjun is motivated by the hard work that he sees Tiger put in and tips from the great player have added to his game. Arjun also shares his belief that you cannot perfect this game, but you can certainly get better at it, by working harder on all elements of your game. And two months of all this over the winter break did all that was needed.

We saw a fit Arjun in India to compete in the EMAAR-MGF Indian Masters and also at the Johnnie Walker Classic. While he did not win, he was in contention and finished fairly well in both the events.
